For divers, it is an opportunity to visit the epicenter of underwater diversity, but the islands also offer a seemingly endless


diversity above the tide-line.

A group of six HUPS members led by Jesse Cancelmo met up with

other friends and new acquaintances from Ann Keibler's group for a 10-day dive trip on the *Arenui*, an Indonesian two-masted schooner. The trip was organized through Oceanic Ventures. Prior to boarding the boat, Craig & Betsy Beasley, Tom Collier, Russell Ramsey, and I took a detour to muck-dive 3 days in Ambon. The diving there was colder and murkier than I remembered but the kaleidoscope of strange fish and critters were still there waiting for us to arrive.

Diving on *Arenui* is a rare experience. Service for the 16 divers was provided by 22 crew and just about everything you needed was provided quickly and with a smile. It's hard to label what we did as "couch potato diving" because of how exciting and productive the diving was but the analogy seems appropriate

on many levels. The weather was amazing, the visibility was excellent, the coral was superb, and every dive had a wealth of things to see on walls, coral gardens, or muck.





The collection of images and video clips I have amassed for preparing the underwater portion of the program is proof in spades for just how productive the trip was for the group. I could easily put together a 6o-minute program of good to great images and video that Tom, Betsy, Russell, Tom, Jesse, Craig and I prepared for use. and video tour of Ambon and the Forgotten Islands of Indonesia on the boutique liveaboard Arenui. This is a program that you must put on your calendar.



President's Page 2

Liveaboard versus Land Based Resorts

This month's **President's Page** will discuss the pros and cons of **Liveaboards vs Land Based Resorts**, the value of each and what factors may go into your decision to book one or the other. One of those factors is location. Location may be important when determining if your underwater photographic dive trip will be on a liveaboard or with a land based operation. There are simply some places you cannot dive without using the services of a liveaboard as the distances from a land based operation may be too great. Such locations include but are not limited to areas in the Maldives, the Galapagos Islands, Socorro Islands, Cocos Island, Bikini atoll in the Marshall Islands, Gardens of the Queen in Cuba and the Forgotten Islands of Indonesia.

There are pros and cons of each so let's explore them before deciding what is best for you and the type of dive vacation you want. You should ask yourself, what type of experience do I want? Do you want a vacation totally about diving and underwater photography or do you want a vacation that you can choose what you want to do, see and eat? Do you enjoy socializing with strangers or to put it another way, are you a tolerant person who gets along well with others? What are your dive qualifications? Are you prone to seasickness? Are you taking non diving family and friends on this trip? Make sure whatever decision you make matches your dive vacation expectations.

Now let's look at those plusses and minuses of each type of trip.

Liveaboard Pros

- 1. Unlimited diving- usually 5 dives/day + night dive
- 2. If dedicated UW Photography liveaboard many camera stations
- 3. Time not wasted traveling to dive sites
- 4. Like minded dedicated divers or UW photographers
- 5.Possible photo pro on board
- 6. Uncrowded diving

Liveaboard Cons

- 1. Rigid itinerary
- 2. Cancellation or changed itinerary due to weather or unforeseen circumstances
- 3. Fuel cost surcharges
- 4. Seasickness
- 5. Cannot compete with land based amenities
- 6. May have limited camera stations or none at all
- 7. Lack of space and privacy with inability to avoid someone you do not get along with
- 8. Possibility of lack of cultural exchanges (depends upon liveaboard and location)
- 9. Limited destinations
- 10. Possible lack of Wi-Fi and wireless communication

Land Based Pros

- 1. Can have just as many dives as you want and may equal liveaboard number of dives
- 2. Dedicated dive resorts with camera room such as in Ambon, Puerto Galera, etc.
- 3. Comfort, space and some degree of privacy
- 4. Cultural exchanges with native people
- 5. Many resorts now have staff photo pros
- 6. Cost may be lower or much lower
- 7. More varied recreational activities
- 8. Possibly more relaxing

Land Based Cons

- 1. Can be fewer dives allowed
- 2. May not be set up for UW or other photography
- 3. Possible long boat rides to dive sites
- 4. Possible crowded dive sites
- 5. May have limited camera stations or none at all

So which is better? As one writer noted, "It depends". Liveaboard diving is something every serious diver should do at least once during his/her diving lifetime. Liveaboards can offer exquisite diving to remote atolls, coral reefs and islands of the world's oceans that land based boats cannot possibly go. On the other hand they are probably not the best choice when travelling with families, non-divers or those wanting to party or enjoy lots of night life into the wee hours. If you want lots of opportunities to shoot land photography, a liveaboard is probably not the best choice for you. Land based resorts provide a compromise for those travelling with others who do not dive but prefer to relax, shop, snorkel or just hang out.

If you still cannot decide after all your research into what is best for you, you may wish to try one of the land based resorts which also has a liveaboard attached to it such as Wakatobi Resort or the Atlantis Dumaguete Resort. Both have liveaboard packages attached to a land based operation. After one week ashore and one week afloat, you can probably be in a better position to make future decisions as to what best suits your vacation needs.

So you ask, what is the answer? There is really no answer as it is an individual decision for what you and your travelling companions want to do.

Monut	Themes	
Jan	Angelfish, Butterfly fish, Surgeonfish	If you aren't sure, look it in your fish ID book or just ask someone you trust for an expert opinion. If it's platter-flat, colorful, and pretty, it's probably what you're looking for.
Feb	Black Background	Any primary subject as long as the background has a nice black color
Mar	Sand & Muck denizens	"On muck dives, underwater photographers find rare nudibranchs, juvenile fish, frogfish, and strange critters that are found nowhere else."
Apr	Something Yellow	A critter or fish that has noticeable yellow. Yellow is the color of gold, butter, and ripe lemons. Yellow is the color people most often associate with amusement, optimism, gentleness, and spontaneity,
May	Close Focus Wide- Angle	It is a sub-division of wide angle, as the name suggests, comprising of images taken at camera to subject distances of less than about two feet.
May Video	General	1 to 3 minutes
Jun	Damselfish, Chromis, Hamlets, Basslets	"A group of small fish generally 3 to 6 inches in length that have a perch like or oval profile" If you aren't sure, look it in your fish ID book.
Jul	Diagonal Composition	"Diagonal lines generally work well to draw the eye of an image's viewer through the photograph. They create points of interest as they intersect with other lines and often give images depth by suggesting perspective." This 1 maybe tough or easy depending on your POV.
Aug	Mollusks (Shells, Nudibranchs, Chitons)	"An invertebrate of a large phylum that includes snails, slugs, mussels, and octopuses. They have a soft, unsegmented body and live in aquatic habitats, and most kinds have an external calcareous shell."
Sep	Vertical Compositions	A photograph with a subject in the vertical plane so the eye is drawn up and down the when viewing the picture.
Oct	Weird &y Spooky	A subject that appears especially in being eerie or disturbing. Or seems to be strikingly odd or unusual, especially in an unsettling way.
Oct Video	General	1 to 3 minutes
Nov	Hawkfish, Drums, Triggerfish	A group of fish that can be found in the odd-shaped swimmers. Note we are looking triggerfish not filefish subjects ask if you are not sure.
Dec	Best of HUPS	NOVICE, INTERMEDIATE, ADVANCED, and CREATIVE contests: First place winners from each month's Novice, Intermediate, and Advanced categories will be entered automatically for judging. The Creative category lets you enter anything you want as long as you do the photography and any special editing.


