A movie grip at the dawn of his career, Paul Cater Deaton is now an award-winning Writer, Producer, Director and Cinematographer. Based in Galveston, he works all over the world on film, TV, music video and documentary projects. #### Paul Cater Deaton - Bio

Paul came to our attention after he submitted a film to HUFF and we contacted him. We learned that he now lives in Galveston after getting blown off St Thomas by Hurricane Irma. He has presented "Finding Nemos Garden" for HUPS in 2020 and is now helping us promote HUFF. He is a man for all seasons with many talents and capabilities. His films are all very entertaining and many of them feature his wry sense of humor.

His show tonight, *Wine Diving in Croatia*, is an abbreviated version of his 21 minute production. He takes us to the Adriatic Coast of Croatia where he follows a group of restaurant entrepreneurs who are bottling and aging wine underwater in Greek style amphoras where the constant temperature and conditions are ideal for bringing out the best in their wines. His visual tour takes us not only below the waters but to the topside wonder of this beautiful old European region. Before and after the show, Paul will talk about his experiences producing the film and will respond to questions.






#### Craig and Betsy Beasley - Kalimaya: Off the Beaten Path Between Bali and Komodo

Indonesia is not generally considered "out of the way" for scuba diving. For divers, it's one of the most popular and most visited countries. But with over 17,000 islands spread across more than 3,200 miles, it is not hard to get off the grid. Kalimaya is a full service dive resort located on the eastern side of Sumbawa, the large island located between Bali (actually Lombok) and Komodo. It seems a bit strange that this area is undiscovered, given the tourist traffic and diving in Bali, Lombok and Komodo. We discovered Kalimaya after seeing so many great photos posted on the internet and tracking them back to this location. Unlike many other out-of-the-way places, except for spotty to no internet connections, we were surprised to find a fully functional dive resort with 24 hour power and a wonderful camera room. But make no mistake: it is not easy to get here and it is the only diving resort in this area.

The island of Sumbawa has seen very little tourist development but has a small airport served by internal flights, mainly served from Bali. Then, it is a 2-hour ride through wild mountains over marginal roads. You can also reach it by private boat from Komodo (Labuan Bajo). Once there, you find a modern luxury resort, air conditioning, pool and a great staff. The food was wonderful, but in this remote and still primitive area, there is no alcohol although you can bring your own. As one would expect, the diving has similarities with Komodo as the geography is similar and is subject to the same tidal and ocean-exchange currents, for which Komodo is renowned. But much of it is unexplored and there is the opportunity to do exploration diving in addition to a number of developed sites. Besides uncrowded dive sites (no other land based dive shops, but some liveaboards are beginning to stop there), pristine reefs and fantastic muck diving, it has a unique dive opportunity: a very active volcano! Our film focuses on the resort and getting there and then shows the magic of diving there, especially under the volcano.

Kalimaya is definitely out of the way and not easy to get to, but we think it is well worth the effort.





#### Mike Greuter - Climbing Mt. Kilimanjaro

Our good friend and HUPS member, Mike Greuter, is just one of those people that can't be categorized easily. If something can be done and it sounds like fun, he'll be on it. After a very successful career as an engineer at GE, he has retired to a quite existence of racing Porsches, traveling the world, climbing mountains like Kilimanjaro in Eastern Africa, and diving with sharks and the bombed out impossibly deep sunken warships in Bikini Atoll. He plays a mean air guitar and tells really bad but funny jokes. That's our man, mild Mike.

His presentation tonight takes us to northeastern Tanzania where the world's tallest free-standing mountain, Uhuru Peak also knows as Mt. Kilimanjaro, rises 19,341 ft above the Plains of Serengeti. More than 50,000 trekkers attempt the climb it annually but only 65% will succeed. It is a massive extinct volcano that demands much from the climbers due to the altitude and terrain. The summit is covered in ice even at the equator. Mike will take us on a visual tour of the climb while describing what it was like and what he saw. On the way up to the summit we will travel through the unusual and constantly changing vegetation before it gives out to rock and tundra. Not only did Mike actually get to the top but it looks like he actually enjoyed every minute doing it. Mike is not your usual person and this is certainly not your usual cookie-cutter show. It's not to be missed.





#### Catrin Pichler - Off the Beaten Path in Indonesia

Catrin is another of those difficult to describe individuals who has found her way to HUPS through HUFF. She lives in Austria close to the Czech border with her lifetime partner, DD. They are both retired teachers and spend much of their time exploring and experiencing the wonders of the outdoors. Their travels take them to many unusual and lesser-visited areas of the world. When they leave home, they plan to stay for a long time and will often wander from one location to another. Catrin always has her camera close at hand and documents what they see along the way. Some of that free spirit is evident in her presentation which is outstanding as always.

She dives with a rather simple but capable camera using continuous lighting. She especially loves macro and super macro work and shows enormous patience working with the blue ring octopuses, frogfish, rhinopias, and tiny nudibranchs that fascinate her so much. The photos and video she creates out of what she captures often find their way into films she creates under the heading of Picat Movies. She enters and wins in international video contests such as Subaverse. One of her films about the charming and tiny Leef Sheep Nudibranchs (Costasiella) was picked up online and has had thousands of views.

Her presentation takes us to places off Borneo to the Derawan Islands and Sulewesi at Bira, Gorgontalo, and Una Una. None of these locations are dive destinations that many of us know anything about but they have a earthy charm and beauty that Catrin is capable of capturing for us to enjoy. This is not just about the underwater scenery, it also shows us the people that live there and their unique cultures.

It is out privilege to have Catrin as an active but distant member of HUPS. It will be 3-4 am in Austria so she won't be joining us at the meeting but she has taped an introduction in her impeccable English for us to enjoy.

## **2021 Photo Contest Categories**

January	Flatfish (disk-shaped fish)	Flounder, angelfish, filefish, butterflyfish, sun- fish, triggerfish, etc. It just needs to have a pro- nounced flat profile and be a FISH.
February	Fish Buddies (2 of the same)	2 Fish of the same species in the composition (Max number is 6)
March	Grouper	Groupers are teleost, typically having a stout body and a large mouth. They are not built for long-distance, fast swimming. They can be quite large.
April	Leading lines (natural lines that lead the eye)	An interesting topic and something that true artists use to point the viewer's eye to the primary "focus" of their work. Elements within the picture (straight lines, curves, spirals, etc.) should be obvious to the eye. You can even use interesting negative space effects if you serve the job of attracting the eye of the subject. Look at your stuff and you'll find plenty of examples. Learn to see and create like the masters.
Мау	Long and thin (fish or critters)	Anything that is characterized by long, thin lines. Can be fish, invertebrates, or even non-living.
June	Silhouettes	Silhouettes are interesting in that the outlines and shape of the subject are what is important. A good silhouette should have almost no detail observable in the primary subject. We're talking form and composition this month so see what you can come up with. If you don't have good examples, you've got plenty of time to go try shooting some. It'll be good for you.
July	Single Color Focus (Blue, Red, Green, Yellow)	Subject must be a single color or shade of color. Examples: green moray eel, green parrotfish, soap fish, sharks, sponge, coral
August	Fish Portraits	Side on, angled views, or face-to-the-camera shots are what we're looking for. You can have more than one fish in the shot, but be reasonable, keep it to 2 or less, please. And, of course, we're talking fish herenot critters.
September	Echinoderms (starfish of all kinds, urchins, sea cucumbers, etc.)	All Starfish are Echinoderms, but not all Echinoderms are Starfish. So there's the dilemma. But for this month's contest all Echinoderms are acceptable. Asteroidea (Sea Stars), Ophiuroidea (Brittle Stars and Basket Stars), crinoids, sea urchins, sand dollars, or sea cucumbers which are Echinoderms.
October	Composition Through A Hole	A hole is a hollow place in a solid body or surface. This theme is looking for a creative use of a hole in the composition. Examples: subject in a porthole of a wreck, goby or eel in a hole, fish swimming in front of a cave entrance - be creative.
November	Animals in the Sand	Fish & critters that live in sand or muck.
December	Best of HUPS	NOVICE, INTERMEDIATE, ADVANCED, and CREATIVE contests: First place winners from each month's Novice, Intermediate and Advanced categories will be entered automatically for judging. The Creative category lets you enter anything you want as long as you do the photography and any special editing.



#### **SILHOUETTES**

#### **UNDERWATER CAMERA SETTINGS AND TECHNIQUE**



A silhouette is when the form of a diver or animal is visible in the frame as a solid black shape. Silhouettes are a great choice if you're too far away from a subject to properly light it or if you're going for a dramatic statement. They can also be used as a framing element to add perspective to your work, particularly when shooting close focus wide angle.

#### Where

All waters, as long as there is decent clarity.

#### **DSLR + Mirrorless**

**ISO:** 200-1000 depending on depth and visibility **Mode:** Manual or any program mode **Aperture:** f/8 to start

Shutter Speed: 1/60 to 1/500 Lens: Fisheye or rectilinear wide angle

#### Point + Shoot

**ISO**: 200-1000

**Mode**: M Manual or any program mode

Aperture: f/8 to start

**Shutter Speed**: 1/60 to 1/500 (any) **Focal Length**: Wide angle; with or without an external wide angle lens



#### **Technique**

Shooting a silhouette underwater may be the easiest of all techniques. The term implies a dark subject outline, with a bright background for a two tone image. The basic formula is to point your lens straight up towards the sun (or brightest part of your water column) with something that blocks the light between you.

The reason we can produce silhouettes so easily underwater is due to the way light falls off as it passes through water. These images are often produced by accident, since the severe tonal range tends to image the highlights, the darks, and not much else. The photographer looks up and sees the brights, and the darks, along with details, but the camera simplifies the image into two tones because it doesn't have the dynamic range to cover the extremes.

When you make a frame (think of the dive boat, a whale shark, or a coral structure), get the sun behind it, and shoot. If it looks like a silhouette to your eye, it will definitely be one. Often even if it looks like there will be textures to your eye (in your darks) they won't be on your capture- it will be a silhouette.

This is one of the few image techniques that encourages shooting subjects far away from you. With 100' of visibility you can silhouette a boat that is 100' away from you.





#### **Strobes**

Technically, strobes have nothing to do with silhouettes, so you don't need them. Theoretically, the strobe can even defeat the silhouette by filling in the shadow areas with color and light. But in practice, shooting directly into the sun (even when it is blocked) will overwhelm the strobes unless you are very close to the subject. Therefore, we can make a silhouette just a part of the image (specifically the background farther away) even with the flash going off in a close focus wide angle (CFWA) image.

#### **HUPS Member, Jackie Rodriquez**





I am Jackie Rodriguez and my photography is under <u>Jackie Curtis Photo</u>. I was born at Beale AFB, California 40 years ago and have lived all over the world. Starting off as a military brat and then serving 5 years in the Army myself. I met my husband Russ of 18 years in Korea (he was also in the Army). Both of us worked in Communication shelters and went to Iraq in 2004 while our oldest daughter was just 4 months old. We have 5 daughters (Ages 17, 15, 12, 7 and 1.5 years) and my 21-year-old Nephew. This family of 8 has settled near Houston, Texas in Humble.

I have a Bachelor of Fine Arts - Photography. I earned my degree in 2012 at The Art Institute in Houston. I am currently pursuing my Masters of Fine Art in Photography at The Academy of Art in San Francisco, but I am looking to finish my Masters locally in Houston.

I have been taking photos the moment I got a hold of my uncle's Polaroid camera at age 8 and received my first camera for my 9th birthday. Perhaps the passion was passed down from my grandfather. He was a Top Secret photographer for the Navy and was a photographer for the Antarctica exploration "Operation Deep Freeze" in the 50's and 60's. I started developing my own film and photos in a small dark room 24 years ago. I gradually made the change from film to digital over the last 20 years, my first digital camera had an 512k card. I love all types of photography and enjoy a new challenge. Kids have always had an easy time with me because I have been working with them for over 20 years and tons of experience.

My journey to underwater photography has not always been a fairy tale, but it is something that drives my creativity and gets my heart moving. I started with some underwater fantasy photography for a fairytale series I was doing in 2010. I got an Underwater camera bag from Amazon to fit a Nikon and even made mermaid costumes. The first test shoot was in a Chlorine pool. I was frustrated with the cloudiness as I was not capturing what I had envisioned. My friend's mom had a Saltwater pool and the photos came out so crisp. I was hooked. Later I did a maternity shoot with a fellow classmate. It was at night with a 750w spotlight over the pool. It was great and then I needed to change out the silicone bead pouch. With all the excitement the cap was not replaced properly. I lost \$9000 in equipment and my school got a brand new D3 and 24-70 lens from my savings account (Insurance denied claim). This set me back another 6 years before I could purchase my own full frame camera. I still shot with my trusty Nikon D90.


I still loved underwater portraits but for 8 years I did not have access to a non-public pool. With my 5th and final pregnancy, I wanted to have my favorite style of photography for this last chance moment. I ordered a \$600 underwater housing with a water sensor alarm. First I tried night time with some halogen flood lights beside the pool, but it was a bust with the available lighting. I then did a day time shoot and they were better but required a lot of editing. I had many more lessons to learn and continued to experiment last October. The goal was to have a black background but we had an overcast and very cold day. The black plastic sheet did not sink and the water became super cloudy. I had also brought weights to help anchor my feet down. I was in the pool for 4 hours and worked with 8 kids. I learned a lot and was finally able to get back in the pool this last March with the help of a stranger and her heated pool. With the kindness of pool time donated and any weather permitting chance I can get; I am trying something new in the water. I find most of my costumes at Goodwill and Facebook market place.

My current project "Blackwater Dreams" has thrown me even further in love with the water. Just as we explore possibilities in our dreams, I have been exploring the possibilities of underwater photography. I would sit and daydream how I could make my visions reality with the tools I have or could make. Being weightless if very freeing even though you are completely surrounded by crushing water; it is an embracing comfort. The reality in your world underwater is what you mold it to be and it can be anything.

## Local Industry Titans to Partner with CCA/BCT/TPWD to Expand HI20 Reef on Upper Texas Coast

Located off Texas' Sabine Pass, nearshore reef continues to grow to premier angling destination.

HI20 Reef—a 160 acre site already home to a 120-foot sunken barge and hundreds of granite blocks—is set to be expanded with hundreds of tons of additional diverse materials, including reef pyramids, steel energy industry structures, low-level relief and concrete culverts. The HI20 reef site, 9 miles off Sabine Pass, is rapidly becoming one of the largest artificial reef projects on the upper Texas coast. Thanks to an impressive list of leading corporations, a massive array of materials is set to be deployed this week. Industry partners Sempra LNG, Chenier Energy, Golden Pass LNG, Motiva, Phillips 66, Shell Oil Company, Friends of Sabine Reef, Forterra Pipe and Precast, Bo-Mac Contractors, Eldridge Construction, and The CCA Music City Chapter, have partnered with Coastal Conservation Association Texas, Building Conservation Trust, and Texas Parks & Wildlife to make this major deployment possible.





"Massive nearshore habitat initiatives like HI20 show the scope of what can happen when grassroots anglers and conservationists come together in partnership with corporations, local and State Government, NGOs and other community leaders to make a real and lasting difference in our coastal waters," said Mic Cowart, Sabine Pass Port Authority Manager. "I am proud to be a part of a project that creates marine habitat that will provide for angling opportunities for present and future generations of Texans. With the vast forest of energy structures that has dotted the Gulf of Mexico for decades slowly disappearing due to federal government regulations, artificial reefing initiatives take on an

added importance. The Sabine area has lost more offshore marine habitat than any other along the Texas coast, making grassroots efforts such as the HI20 Reef even more vital for strong and dynamic marine resources. We cannot thank our local industry partners enough, for helping financially and providing ocean-going tugs and barges as well."

"This project really has captured the excitement and imagination of the local community and beyond. It has been inspiring to be a part of the vital work being done through this unique partnership," said Rocky Chase, chairman of CCA Texas' Government Affairs Committee. "HI20 will undoubtedly have considerable benefits not just for the marine ecosystem and the anglers who enjoy it, but for the local economy as well."
