HUPS Photo Contest Winners for 2010

This year was another good one for the HUPS Photo contest. For the first time, we split up our photographers into 3 groups: Advanced, Intermediate, and Novice. The old category of Compact Digital was abandoned after 2 years in favor of this new format. It appears that the experiment was a success with a large number of Intermediate contestants entering great images month after month.

In the Novice division, Kandace Heimer won over newcomer Lance Glowacki (2nd) and a hard-charging John VanAtta (3rd). The high quality of the entries in the Novice group just goes to show how well HUPS is doing in fostering underwater photographic skills. Mike Brower took 4th place with Jan Baughman showing well in 5th.

The Intermediate division was hotly contested throughout the year with Kay Collier finally winning by only 23 points over Paul McDonald. The couple of Debbie Mensay (3rd) and Jim Mensay (5th) showed that the contest can be a family affair. Mike Greuter slipped into 4th, just 2 points behind Debbie.

The Advanced contest went back and forth between Ken Knezick (the early leader), Jackie Reid (the last one standing), and Tom Collier (pushing hard at the end). Jackie continued his run of winning or tying for first for well over a decade. Tom was only 5 points off the lead at the finish line but couldn't outpoint Jackie for the win. Attention HUPS members! You have a vested interest in this – It affects your diving and photography!

The proposed rules and plan detail, parts of which are discussed below, are on the HUPS web site. Your comments about them can be made directly from the HUPS web site, or by e-mailed to <u>fgbmanagementplan@noaa.gov</u>.

The Flower Garden Banks National Marine Sanctuary (FGBNMS) has released a draft management plan (DMP) covering the next five to ten years. Part of that plan has also been released as proposed rules. This is the time for you to "weigh in" with your opinion.

The proposed rules (Federal Register/ Vol.75, No. 204 document is referenced) - Last chance to make sure they're intent and wording is clear.

1) Issue - "Rays and Whale Sharks" - Page 65257, II. 4.; page 65258 & 65259, II. D.; page 65260 III. "Regulation to protect rays and whale sharks", page 65260 & 65261 part 922.121 and 922.122

Our comments – The scope is too expansive. They discuss Mantas but want to cover "all" rays (for example – if while you are passing near a buried sting ray and it decides to move – you have violated a reg.). The normal behavior of these creatures' is not factored into the violation decision. As proposed, diver/creature interaction is minimized and most of the creatures' communication clues are considered support for law enforcement charging the diver with a regulation violation (creature making physical contact with diver or boat, ctc.). Their definition of "attract or attracting" is OK but the "Summary of the Proposed Revisions", "Classification", "Definitions" and "Prohibited" sections need significant corrections for aspects dealing with "touching or disturbing". Their use of a touching study from Cayman Islands and statement that the loss of energy a creature suffers in these encounters with divers can affect their overall health is really pushing reality.

- Issue Alpha Flag Same Federal Register, same pages as above. Our comments – Most divers don't recognize the Alpha Flag. Recommend both the Alpha and Diver Down Flags be flown.
- 3) Issue Same Federal Register, page 65260. The wording in the proposed rules states that "the divers' experience will not be significantly altered by these rules".

Our comments – If that is the intent, the regulations need to be reworded to support this "no change in diver experience". A regulatory observer, who relied only on the information provided by these regulations, would come to conclusions that no experienced diver would. Because of a lack of clarity in the proposed regulations about these creatures behaviors, and specific instructions on how to handle a creature initiated interaction - What is a normal interaction, would be misconstrued as disturbing the creatures. Since the proposed rules do not tell the whole story, the vessel operator and/or divers thus bears the total responsibility.

The DMP - Opportunity to comment before final plans are made and regulations proposed.

4) Issue – Sanctuary Expansion - Boundary expansion and modification, with boundaries based on the critical habitat area and a 500-meter buffer zone, includes modifying the existing boundaries of East and West Flower Garden Banks and Stetson Bank, and adding Horseshoe Bank, McGrail Bank, Geyer Bank, Bright Bank, Sonnier Bank, Alderdice Bank, MacNeil Bank, Rankin Bank, and 28 Fathom Bank.

Our comments – Great, Sonnier, Bright and Geyer Banks can provide dive opportunities.

- 5) Issue Expansion of present mooring system to cover those diving areas.
 - Our comment Great! Eliminates anchor damage and increases diving safety.
- 6) Issue The Vessel registration system and collection on information on actual diver's (visitor') use of the FGBNMS. (2 reporting systems)

Our comments – Good, the FGBNMS needs to have actual user information to make sound management decisions. 7) Issue - The "Diving Impacts" study.

Our comments – As proposed it would use the mooring buoy areas and compare them with other areas of the banks that have similar depths, but no mooring buoy access. We believe the present mooring buoy system properly managed diving impacts, and therefore we expect no significant findings.

What should you do? You should comment! That lets them know that you are aware and care about what they're doing. Tell them whether you support adding these additional banks. Comment on "Rays and Whale Sharks" – Ask for a rewording to better define and limit it to "Manta Rays, Mobula Rays and Whale Sharks". The proposed rules should also provide proper guidance on breaking off such interaction when they become intrusive or dangerous for these creatures. Failure to follow the "break off guideline" would be a rules infraction, not the creature's indications (leaving the divers, turning way, moving a short distance away, shuttering, etc.) that it is breaking off contact. The same for when one of these creatures make physical contact (touching) with you - not following a "back off procedure" should be the legal issue, not the fact that the creature made physical contact.

There is a difference between divers swimming along with them verses pursuing or disrupting them. There is a difference between an underwater photographer angling for a picture and pursuing or disturbing these creatures. If this swimming behavior or photographing practice can be misconstrued under the proposed regulations, they need to be rewritten!
